

ILLINOIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY: 2023 FALL VETO SESSION RECAP AND ANTICIPATING THE 2024 SPRING SESSION

he Illinois General Assembly's 2023 Fall Veto Session highlighted some of the State's pressing legislative issues and set the stage for the upcoming 2024 Spring Session.

FALL VETO SESSION RECAP

Following the first week of the Fall Veto Session (October 24-26), and a one week break, the Illinois Legislature returned to Springfield for the second week of Veto Session on November 7th- 9th. This represented the final week of legislative action in 2023. The General Assembly returns on January 16th to formally commence the 2024 legislative session.

During the Veto Session, the General Assembly took action on bills that were vetoed by the Governor following the 2023 Spring Session, and in addition, considered and passed several other legislative matters.

While other issues were considered and passed, the General Assembly devoted the greatest amount of time and attention to three issues during the 2023 Fall Veto Session: the "removal of the State's nuclear power plant construction moratorium"; the Invest in Kids Scholarship Tax Credit Program; and the Chicago Public School Board plan.

Nuclear Power Plant Construction Moratorium "Lifted"

The "nuclear moratorium", which was enacted by the General Assembly in 1987, prevented the construction of new nuclear power plant facilities



until a permanent disposal site for highlevel nuclear waste was established. HB 2473 (Yednock/Rezin) does not entirely lift the 36-year-old moratorium on nuclear construction in Illinois. Rather, this legislation creates a regulatory structure for the construction of small modular nuclear reactors, or SMRs. HB 2473 directs the Illinois Emergency Management

Agency (IEMA) to be the lead regulatory agency for SMRs. During the Veto Session's final week, HB 2473 passed both the Senate and House with overwhelming majorities. The Governor's approval of HB 2473 is widely expected.

Chicago Elected School Board

The Illinois General Assembly left Springfield without adopting a final process for Chicago's elected school board. Divisions over the

city's elected school board remain — including disagreement over how many members should be appointed versus elected, and disagreement as to the establishment of the school board member district map. These issues will most certainly be considered again when the General Assembly returns to Springfield in January.





Invest in Kids Scholarship Tax Credit Program Extension



HB 4194, which would have extended the Invest in Kids Scholarship Tax Credit Program, did not receive consideration from either chamber prior to adjournment of the 2023 Fall Veto Session. It appears almost certain that this issue will again be considered when the General Assembly returns to Springfield for the 2024 Spring Session.

Public Construction Bond Act - Retainage Reduction

During the 2023 Spring Session, the Illinois Mechanical & Specialty Contractors Association (IMSCA) initiated legislation amending the

Public Construction Bond Act. This legislation provides that a local governmental entity may not withhold more than 5% retainage when a contractor has furnished a surety bond or its equivalent. This provision was included in HB 2878, as part of an omnibus bill pertaining to procurement policy changes. At the conclusion of the Spring Session, the Governor



issued an amendatory veto of this bill recommending the removal of a provision expanding transportation public-private partnerships to local governments. During the Veto Session, the General Assembly voted overwhelmingly to accept the Governor's recommendations for change. As a result, the IMSCA initiated retainage provision will become law on January 1, 2024.

ANTICIPATING POTENTIAL 2024 SPRING SESSION ISSUES

Shortly after the General Assembly adjourned the Fall Veto Session, the legislative calendars for the 2024 Spring Session were released. While both chambers will return to Springfield in January to convene the 2024 Spring Session, the chambers are only scheduled to convene for three days that month (i.e. January 16-18), and a total of six days in February (i.e., February 6-8 and 20-22). Beginning in March, the General Assembly will meet on an almost weekly basis until May 24th -- the scheduled adjournment date.

It is important to note that 2024 is an election year with the primary elections happening during the scheduled 2024 Spring Session. Accordingly, and as a practical matter, the 2024 Spring Session will not commence in earnest until after the primary elections -- which will be held on March 19th. With respect to legislative issues that may receive consideration during the 2024 Spring Session, there is considerable speculation that the General Assembly may consider a supplemental appropriations package for the current fiscal year that may include additional State funding for migrant related shelters and services. There is also speculation in 2024 to expand transportation public-private partnerships to also apply to local governments.

It remains to be seen whether the pending trial of former Chicago Alderman Ed Burke or federal racketeering trial of former House Speaker Michael Madigan, scheduled to begin in April, will impact the consideration of additional ethics legislation. Speculation also continues that the General Assembly may vote to propose that a constitutional amendment dealing with reproductive rights be placed on the ballot for ratification at the November 2024 General Election.

Finally, with Governor Pritzker's recent visibility and continued activity on national issues, and with Chicago hosting the Democratic National Convention next August, the 2024 Session promises to be interesting!

ILLINOIS SUPREME COURT EXPANDS INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR CONSTRUCTION DEFECTS

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ogether, AGC of America and its Illinois Chapters have achieved a major breakthrough as to commercial general liability insurance (CGL) coverage for construction defects under Illinois law. The Illinois Supreme Court issued its opinion in Acuity v. M/I Homes of Chicago, LLC, Docket No. 129087 on November 30, 2023. The case involved

CGL coverage for construction defects resulting in water damage to a townhome project. In that context, the Supreme Court clarified the law to agree with many state supreme courts that such property damage is an "occurrence" in Illinois. The Supreme Court's clarification is extremely favorable to the construction industry and was supported by an amici curiae brief sponsored by AGC of

America, National Association of Home Builders, American Subcontractors Association and local chapters in Illinois.

For over twenty years, courts in Illinois had interpreted the definitions of "property damage" and "occurrence" in the standard commercial general liability ("CGL") policy to deny coverage for property damage arising out of defective construction as to the entire construction project itself. Those courts found coverage only in the unlikely event of damage to other real property, and perhaps to personal property of project owners. In reality, this amounted to little, if any coverage for Illinois insureds, and Illinois has lagged behind numerous other jurisdictions in upholding coverage for unexpected and unintended property damage arising out of faulty workmanship by the insured. The Supreme Court of Illinois noted that such a narrow view of coverage is unsupported by the policy language, and it joined the majority of jurisdictions in holding that unexpected and unintended physical injury to tangible property arising out of defective work amounts to an occurrence of property damage under a CGL policy.

The court further opined that once an occurrence of property damage is found, resort must be had to the property damage exclusions within the policy to determine ultimate coverage, including exclusions relating to that particular part of property damage upon which work is being performed out of which the property damage arises; that particular part of real property that must be repaired or replaced due to incorrect work by the insured; property damage to the insured's work after completion (subject to an exception for work performed by the insured contractor's subcontractors); or impaired property or property that has not been physically injured. In doing so, the Court rejected the notion that property damage arising out of defective workmanship amounts to an uninsurable "business risk," the cost of which is to be borne by the insured contractor itself. Aligning itself with the majority of jurisdictions, the Court concluded that uninsured business risks are to be sorted out through application of the property damage exclusions. In that regard,

> it remanded the case to the trial court to determine issues relating to the applicability of those exclusions to the facts before it.

> All in all, AGC, NAHB, and ASA members had a good day before the Illinois Supreme Court. That success is the culmination of nearly twenty years of advocating before numerous state and federal courts throughout the United

States on these issues through the filings of amicus curiae briefs. The brief in Acuity v. M/I Homes was primarily authored and filed by Patrick J. Wielinski of Cokinos Young, Dallas, Texas, joined by Clifford Shapiro of Chicago. Patrick and his firm have participated in the filing of such briefs for many years.

The Construction Advocacy Fund of the AGC of America provides the financial resources that the association requires to extend its advocacy into federal and state courtrooms across the country. In conjunction with the association's legislative, regulatory, and public programs, the association's litigation program seeks to protect if not enhance the business environment for construction contractors. ILLINOIS WORKS Bid Credit Program

THE ILLINOIS WORKS **BID CREDIT PROGRAM'S STRATEGIC** INVESTMENT IN A MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL TALENT **PIPELINE FOR** THE STATE'S CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY AND THE TRADES.

The Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) Office of Illinois Works is a new bureau whose creation was mandated by the 2019 Illinois Works Job Program Act resulting from Governor Pritzker's historic \$45 billion capital plan, Rebuild Illinois. The office is focused on bringing about equity and inclusion to construction and the trades by creating a viable and sustainable workforce pipeline targeting residents have access to the resources and education that will lead to a successful career in construction and the trades. With the support of community partners as well as the building trades and the construction industry, the Office of Illinois Works delivers three key programs to reach its goals.

The Illinois Works Apprenticeship Initiative opens the doors of opportunity into the construction industry and the trades. It applies



underrepresented populations (including women, minorities, and veterans) located throughout the state. By providing grants to pre- apprenticeship program providers, training, and an incentivized hiring process for contractors, the bureau's goal is that all Illinois to public works projects with an estimated cost of \$500,000 or more, including capital grants and direct capital contracts and awards. For applicable projects, the goal is for DOLregistered apprentices to perform 10% of the total labor hours worked in each prevailing wage category or 10% of the estimated labor hours in each prevailing wage category, whichever is less. Half of the 10% goal for each wage classification must be performed by apprentices that graduates from Illinois Works or two other approved pre-apprenticeship programs.

The Illinois Works Pre-Apprenticeship Program is a grant program that creates, throughout the state, a qualified talent pipeline to fill job opportunities with diverse candidates. This program deliverers preapprenticeship skills training through a network of over 35 non-profit, community-based organizations, including community colleges, faithbased organizations, and business associations. In 2024, the Illinois Works Pre- Apprenticeship Program Provider Network will serve over 1,700 community residents interested in entering the construction industry and the trades and making a life-long career in this important

sector of the economy. All approved providers serve underrepresented populations (women, minorities, and veterans) and prepare them to enroll in DOL-registered apprenticeship programs of their choice. Participants of the program attend tuition-free and receive a stipend and other supportive services to help overcome systemic barriers to entering the construction industry and the trades.

The third component of the office is the Illinois Works Bid Credit Program. The goal of this initiative is to tie together the other programs that make up Illinois Works by incentivizing contractors to hire and retain from Illinois Works' pool of graduates, resulting in increased diversity in their workforce. Contractors and subcontractors can voluntarily enroll to participate and earn generous amounts of bid credits by hiring Illinois Works Pre-Apprenticeship Program graduates. Bid Credits can be earned for graduates working on any construction project including both public and privately funded projects. Contractors can, in turn, redeem bid credits on any future state-funded construction project.

Aside from helping meet compliance goals and giving contractors an upper hand in the bidding process, the Bid Credit Program can also assist with locating qualified graduates ready and willing to take advantage employment opportunities throughout the State of Illinois. Each year hundreds of community members successfully complete the Illinois Works Pre-apprenticeship Program at over 30 locations across Illinois. These program graduates were thoroughly vetted for interest in construction and earned nationally- recognized construction and workplace safety certifications including NCCER, MC3, ICCB, OSHA-10, and First Aid/CPR.

To connect Illinois Works graduates with contractors and job opportunities, the Office of Illinois Works created a Career Services team. Contractors may complete the Illinois Works Employer Form to submit job orders to the Career Services team which will trigger a job matching process that produces a list of graduates that meet the criteria specified by

> the contractor. The list provides contact information, resumes, construction trades interests and experience, and availability status along with earned certifications for each graduate. Contractors can then identify and directly contact graduates who available for employment and sponsorship into a DOL-registered apprenticeship program.

The Pre-Apprenticeship Program tab has information on how to connect with the over 1,000 program graduates across the state while the Bid Credit Program tab will allow them to fill out the Bid Credit Program Interest Form. This tab also includes information on upcoming trainings and other relevant tools and resources. The Apprenticeship Initiative tab contains information about the program's compliance goals and requirements and contact information to communicate directly with the team.
